



Lone Working Policy and Risk Assessment

Policy Statement

Bright Eyes are committed to children's welfare and safety including maintaining OFSTED ratios and safeguarding children. Employees are safeguarded by lone working risk assessments and policies. Employees are trained in safe lone working practices and are monitored by managers.

Lone building working is defined as one practitioner with children on their own in the building. Lone building working is not permitted under any circumstance due to safeguarding requirements.

Lone room working is defined as one practitioner with a group of children in ratio within a play room with other staff members in the building to support if needed. Practitioners may work in the rooms on their own with children within ratio for short periods of time provided they hold the following;

- Full DBS check
- A valid Paediatric first aid qualification (12-hour course)
- A valid level 2 or above safeguarding qualification
- Are 18 years of age or over

Practitioners and managers are in contact with each other via radios to ensure they can call for assistance if needed. The door will be open between the toddler and preschool room to allow for free flow play and a member of staff must always be present in that room with the group of children. If one group exceeds 26, the rooms will be separated with the correct staff: child ratio in each one. Children under one are kept in the baby area during free play with over one's being allowed to explore the other rooms under close supervision of a practitioner.

Rooms are fully equipped with a first aid kit and children's belonging are left in the room when practitioners need to lone room work. Practitioners are not able to lone room work in the following incidences;



- The practitioner has a medical condition that may
- The parent has expressed in the child's registration of one key worker

inhibit their ability to lone work

form that they do not wish for their child to be left in sole care

If children are sleeping, a practitioner is allocated to sit with them whilst they sleep to carry out sleep checks. We do not leave children unattended, even when sleeping.
